From Pastor David

When you think of Easter what are the words and feelings that come to your mind?

Mark has a way of taking what are some of the grandest moments in the other three gospels and pulling the rug out from under us instead of building to a grand finale as Matthew, Luke, and John do. We just celebrated Palm Sunday, and we see Mark do this when he describes Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, *"Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve."* We see Jesus' grand procession and the crowd's adoration, and then when Jesus finally gets to where he was going, he simply looks around and goes back to where he came from. Mark does all this and more when he describes the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. The women come to the tomb on the Resurrection morning, find the stone rolled away, and encounter an angel who tells them the good news. Then Mark says, *"And they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid."* This is how Mark ended his gospel. Now, if you open your Bible you'll see that there are two additional endings to Mark's gospel. These were added to the Gospel after Mark wrote it to make it easier to digest, to make it feel better, to absolve us of asking the tough questions that come to mind if we simply linger on Mark's sudden and austere ending.

Let's go back to that question I asked at the beginning of this article. When you think of Easter what are the words and feelings that come to your mind? I doubt that many of us immediately think of *terror, amazement,* and *fear* when we consider what Easter means to us. Yet, this is how the women that came to attend to Jesus' body experienced the first Easter morning. Their response to the news of resurrection is almost the exact opposite of how we proclaim the good news!

I'm preaching from John's gospel this Easter morning, but Mark's account has been stuck in my head over these last few weeks as we approach the Day of Resurrection. I wonder, does the news of resurrection elicit the same response in me as it did the women in Mark's gospel so long ago, and I conclude that it really doesn't. I generally find great comfort and hope in resurrection. So why do the women's response stick with me so much?

I've come to the conclusion that it's because resurrection isn't just about joining Jesus in heaven, but it is also about entering into new life in Jesus right now. Resurrection gives us assurance of our place with Christ after we die and eternal life, but it should also give us the assurance and courage that because Christ triumphed over death, there is no power on this earth that is too great for us to overcome when we walk with Christ. And it is here that I begin to find some *terror, amazement, and fear.* If I am to truly enter into a new life in Jesus right here and right now it means that before the power of resurrection can be seen in my personal, day-to-day life, there are things within me that need to die first. After all, you can't have resurrection without death. Without the cross, we never would have had Easter morning. It is in consideration of that death which is required that I begin to fear. It frightens me to consider what it is to be fully given over to Jesus. It frightens me to let loose the carefully held control that I try to exert over my decisions and priorities. It frightens me to think that there is much in my heart that I yet need to change to better live in and reflect God's glory. It frightens me to understand that I hold myself back from Jesus and cling to earthly considerations, politics, ideals, passions, and thought; rather than seeking to live in His presence as fully as I am called to.

In the midst of the joy, the celebration, the remembrance, the thanksgiving of the greatest news humanity has ever received, I encourage you to ask yourself, "What terrifies, amazes, and frightens me about Easter?".

Confirmation

Pastor David will be offering a confirmation class this spring. Most of us will seek help whenever we face a medical issue that we can no longer handle without somebody that has been trained to address that issue. Why then do we (myself included) try to handle life's struggles on our own? Why do we think that we should not be overwhelmed by that medical diagnosis, by a long-lasting pandemic, by the loss of a family member, by a new baby, by whatever curveball life threw our way? We find ourselves continuing to say I am fine when we are most definitely not okay. We don't want to bother or lay our burdens on anyone else, so we struggle under the weight of these struggles on our own. While I know that Jesus said that we would face hardships in this world, he promised that we would not meet those hardships alone. Sometimes, we have to ask for that help. Asking for help does not make us weak; it makes us human, and Jesus understands us perfectly in our humanity.

So reach out to a friend, our pastor, or even myself to be paired with a Stephen Minister. Whomever you reach out to, don't continue to struggle alone. If you decide to reach out to me, our Stephen Ministers are trained to walk with you and help you not face the world's hardships alone. Stephen Ministers answer Jesus's call to "Bear one another's burdens, and in this way, you will fulfill the law of Christ." Galatians 6:2. When a Stephen Minister sits with you or your struggling friend, they bear a part of the burden, and they remind you that Jesus is present to help carry that burden with you.

Will you reach out for help? Will you help a friend and tell them about Stephen Ministry?
