

# From Pastor David

One thing that I always try to do as a preacher is to follow the path of the Christian Year. To mark the points and seasons of the year with appropriate sermons and worship services. One thing the Christian year does is follow Jesus' life, from our expectation of His arrival at Christmas to our expectation of His return to earth. Between these two points of expectations for the coming of our Lord, we follow His life and how God leads us back to Him through salvation in Jesus and the indwelling power of the Holy Spirit. As we follow Jesus' journey on earth through the Christian Year, we are invited to participate in how Christ breaks into our world and seeks to enter into our lives. We stand at the brink of the beginning of Lent. March 2 is Ash Wednesday when we'll be invited to prayerfully reflect upon our lives the honest condition of our souls as we begin to watch Jesus' journey to the cross.

This time of year is generally bittersweet for me, as I give thanks for the self-emptying love of God's grace shown to us through Jesus while coming to terms with my own sin and need to be remade in Christ. To add to this weight, Ash Wednesday will be forever linked in my mind to the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. On Ash Wednesday 2020, I offered Ashes-to-Go in our community and that afternoon everything began shutting down as COVID became a reality we all had to face, and subsequently changing our world. We shut down the church that Ash Wednesday and two years later still feel the effects of an event we had initially hoped would pass in the span of a few weeks. The hope of Lent, and the cross and grave that looms in the distance is that at the end there is an empty tomb! Whatever sin, brokenness, pain, apathy, inaction, or questioning belabors us, can be overcome by Christ who went to the cross, because the one who rose from the dead is making all things new!

As we've struggled a bit as a church to come back from COVID, we make a statement this Lent. That we move forward in Christ to reclaim and do new things. We invite you to join us as we worship and seek Jesus. We'll meet Ash Wednesday. Pastor David will be offering Ashes-to-Go again in the morning out in the community, and we'll be meeting for pancakes and worship on March 2nd in the evening. We invite you to participate in two opportunities to learn and develop spiritually. We'll be offering a 5 week Sunday School class about Spiritual Gifts. We will also be offering a Bible Study (beginning March 1 on Tuesdays in the morning or evening) about the cross and all that the cross means to our world. We hope that you'll join us as we continue our walk with our Lord this Lenten Season!

Come join him for a short prayer and the imposition of Ashes as we begin Ash Wednesday giving all we have to the Lord.


# **Ash Wednesday Pancake Supper and Worship**

Part of Stephen Ministry is regular meetings to offer support to each other and complete continuing education to stay prepared for serving anyone who needs care. During our January meeting, we talked about trust. Trust is an integral part of any Stephen Ministry program being successful. We talked about three areas where trust is essential. First, trust in God, Trust in others (care receiver with their Stephen Minister, for example), and self-trust.

Stephen Ministry is a caring ministry that tries to point care receivers back to God and all he is doing in their lives. At times in our lives, situations or struggles can cause us to lose trust in the faithfulness and love of God. Our role at that point is to help that person see that even amid hardship, they can still trust God. If that is not possible, we as the Stephen Minister can still trust God to be there and act in that person's life through the meetings we have with care receivers.

Another aspect of trust is self-trust. I know that there have been times in my life when I lost trust in myself and my emotions or feelings. Part of self-trust is acknowledging that we need help and then reaching out for that help, whether professional counseling, meeting with Pastor David, or reaching out to me to start seeing a Stephen Minister. Trusting yourself does not mean doing it all by yourself.

The last aspect of trust that we discussed was trust in others. The trust of this congregation in Stephen Ministry has been appreciated, and we strive to keep that trust. We keep trust as Stephen Ministers by keeping care receivers' names and what they discuss with their Stephen Ministers confidential.

When life is hard, it can be hard to trust others to sit in the hard with us, and that is what Stephen Ministers are trained and willing to do. Will you trust yourself and reach out when you need someone to talk to and sit with you? Will you trust us with your friends and family members and tell them about Stephen Ministry so they can get support?
